1. Team Sportsmanship Awards

- 323 gold awards
- 151 silver awards
- 21 bronze award
- 26 teams did not qualify for any award
- Genesee Valley Bronze Bears – Every team qualified for an award
- Individual notices will be sent to teams

2. Rule Changes

- U15 and U16 change to a 3 referee system for the 2012 season. Try it next season.

A. Issues Discussed

- Will this be a cost issue for clubs?
- Are there enough refs for this?
- Budget issue for some teams
- Some may have 15 year old ARs'
- League cannot fund third ref unless registration fee goes up.
- Possibly test with Boys Div I/Girls Div I
- There would be 42 total games (7 teams * 6 home games) each Div I (Boys only)
- \$360 additional cost for each team to implement sideline refs

B. Preview of rule changes agreed on by the board

- U11-U12 minimum roster size will be 9 players instead of 7 to register
- U13-U19 minimum roster size will be 11 players instead of 7 to register

C. Call up rule expanded for next year

- 15 year old on a U15 team can be called up to U16, U17, U19
- Eliminate requirement of a signature official on the call up form

- D. Only gender VPs can approve a game not being played.
 - E. Ineligible player- eliminate the 3 point deduction (Still get a forfeit but no 3 point deduction)
 - F. Water Breaks: Clock will stop a maximum of 3 minutes. This will be included in the DCs' briefing. It would work better if players were allowed to leave the field.
 - G. Sanctions above the minimum fine are appealable.
 - H. Fans on the same side of the field
 - If we raise the fee will it have any impact – overall response = No
 - Ref has to enforce this rule
3. Silent Soccer (Something we should try?)
- Only players and refs are allowed to speak
 - Coaches – sit and can talk to the substitutes on the sidelines
 - Parents – clap but cannot talk or yell out during the game
 - This could help reduce spectator, coaches' fines.
 - Started around 2006 and already in place in Michigan and Virginia
 - Possibly try it right after July 4th for two days (Tues. /Wed.)
 - Good to teach players, coaches, parents
 - This might be a good way to teach players coping mechanisms of how to deal with the noise
 - Look for more information forthcoming on the website.
4. Club Improvement Activities (Should we keep doing Model/Leadership Award?)
- Yes- continue next year
 - Very good- it allows coaches/Presidents to compare
 - Good to have out there as it sets a standard for play
 - Gave us an opportunity to be constructive with teams (good constructive communication tool)
 - Should we take the data we have and establish a probation program?
 - Zero Tolerance and Awards Program are helping.
 - Should we kick out teams that are repeat offenders?
 - Do you want to see the data on the website? Purpose is for improvement not punishment. Mark has been working on a club login. Information could be placed there but hidden behind a log-in so that not everyone can see it.
5. RDYSL sponsored “best practices”/ Q & A night for club officers?
- Open up to coaches as well as club presidents
 - Possibly run one hour before the AGM meeting in Nov?
 - Email questions in
 - Have Club Field Coordinators and Registrars attend

- What's the best solution for the kids?
- What subjects can we cover at the coaches' meeting to make it more informative?
- Run a free clinic with high profile coach to come in prior to AGM
- Ref discussion is good as are rule changes
- Other parts of this meeting are repetitive

6. Other Topics Discussed

- A. It was suggested that players U8-U12 must play with their natural age group. No- This would be a disadvantage for smaller clubs. This should be club policy and not RDYSL.
- B. Expansion of the league within a Geographic Footprint. There is a limited talent pool and limited field availability. It is understood that there are loopholes and the board will relook at this rule.
- C. Game Fee Changes – Possibility of a “Get out of Jail Free Card” for game change \$85 fee?
- D. Thruway League- U14 Boys have a 3 ref system. Official fees are up.

Silent Soccer

Examples

- Imagine you're undertaking a fairly difficult task
 - Assembling a piece of furniture with instructions in a foreign language
 - Filling out IRS Form 4562 on April 14
 - Standing on the highest rungs of a ladder painting the crown molding in your living room with 14-foot ceilings.
- Think it would help if someone yelled at you during the process? Of course not.

Examples 2

- Player receives ball in offensive end of field just outside the top of the box
- From their sideline you hear
 - Shoot
 - Pass (work it around)
 - Dribble or take them (defender) on
- From the opponents sideline you hear
 - Pressure or challenge
 - Channel
 - Double the player
- Of course then we have those just yelling whatever

What is Silent Soccer

- Only the players and referees will be allowed to say anything out loud during the silent soccer game
- Coaches are asked to sit in a chair and are allowed to chat with their substitute players on the sidelines
- Parents are only allowed to clap to acknowledge good play

Why do Silent Soccer

- Give players some latitude so they can discover how to play the game without direction
- Give the game back to the kids
- The shouting is detrimental to the children's development as soccer players and at worst can turn them off to the sport entirely
- Put things into perspective for spectators who thought they weren't being that loud
- Help reduce spectator and coach fines

Background of Silent Soccer

- Lots of information on websites
- Earliest reference found was 2002
- ESPN article
- Looked at states around New York
 - New York
 - Pennsylvania
 - Michigan
 - Virginia
 - Others

Past Experiences

- Takes some getting used to
- Kids loved it
- Best game ever
- Coaches found players were are to try things done in practice
- There will always be a few that feel you are taking their “right to yell” away

One Implementation Proposal

- Pick Tuesday and Wednesday second week in July. Barring rescheduled games this gets all but BU15-16 and GU17-19.
- **U8-U10** games observe silent sidelines for 2nd half
- **U11-U19** games will use the silent sideline guidelines for the whole game
